

COM 100: Introduction to Human Communication Spring A 2022

I. COURSE OVERVIEW

This 7.5-week, 3-credit course is designed to introduce the basic concepts of human communication, processes, and environments. COM 100 surveys communication topics related to culture, identity, organizations, and relationships. By the end of the semester, you should have a fuller understanding of appropriate and effective communication based on your knowledge of theoretical concepts and their applications.

Learning Outcomes and Topics

Upon successful completion of this course, you should be able to:

- 1. Define and describe the complex nature of communication.
- 2. Identify and describe the various contexts of communication study, including interpersonal, small group, organizations, public, and mass communication.
- 3. Explain the features of communication common to all contexts, including verbal and nonverbal.
- 4. Connect theoretical concepts of communication to everyday experiences.
- 5. Define key terms used by communication researchers and practitioners.
- 6. Describe the relationships between the discipline of communication and other academic areas of study.

Topics include:

- Fundamentals of Human Communication
- Perception, Self and Performing Identity
- Verbal Communication
- Nonverbal Communication
- Interpersonal Communication
- Intercultural Communication
- Public and Mass Communication

II. WEEKLY ACTIVITIES AND TIME COMMITMENT

Class preparation means reviewing all material required in a given module and completing all assignments by the deadlines indicated. Attendance in an online course means logging into the platform on a regular basis and participating in all of the activities posted.

COM 100 requires 135 hours of work. Therefore, expect to spend approximately 18-20 hours per week preparing for and engaging in this course.

Course Content and Assignments

Videos

- Lectures from your instructional team on specific topics, designed to help you learn key concepts
- Applied-learning videos that illustrate or exemplify the concepts you are studying

Readings

Our course makes use of open educational resources (OERs), **no purchase necessary,** including your primary source textbook, <u>Communication in the Real</u> <u>World: An Introduction to Communication Studies</u>. (This work is made available under the terms of a <u>Creative Commons Attribution-NonCommercial-ShareAlike</u> license.)

This book has been adapted by your faculty team for this course, and you will find selected, required readings from it in each of the modules. Please visit the "Learning Objectives, Activities, and Deadlines" unit at the start of each module for a list of associated readings.

Qualitative Feedback

You will be giving and receiving various forms of feedback throughout the course. This feedback will be used to assess the quality of your work and help you improve. Feedback can take the following forms:

- Self assessment (Audit Track students): You will assess your own work on some assignments, using provided rubrics and guidelines.
- Instructor assessment (Credit Eligible Track students): Students who are credit eligible will receive personalized feedback on graded assessments from a content expert.
 - The expected time frame for receiving instructor feedback on assignments is 7 days. Please understand that due to a high volume of learners, grading may sometimes take longer than expected.

Graded Assignments

Graded assignments are required, and count toward the final grade for credit-eligible students planning to earn credit. Students *must* submit *all* assignments via the course site unless otherwise instructed. Each assessment has submission instructions.

Exit Quizzes (35%): You will take a total of **seven** exit quizzes, one per module. Each quiz is open book, but must be completed by you (see the Academic Integrity section). The quizzes are multiple choice and based on that module's readings and video materials. You must complete them by the stipulated deadlines. **Reaction-Response (15%)**: There will be a total of **3** Reaction-Response assignments. These assignments will include a prompt-question about a theme related to the content of the module. You are expected to write a 400-450 word reaction-response through which you will use the concepts and theories from class to make your arguments based on what you think. (A grading rubric will be provided and used to evaluate your submissions.)

Situational Analyses (15%): There will be a total of **4** situational analysis assignments. These scenarios are designed to measure your competency, and help you directly apply key concepts to real-life situations. You will write a 400-450 word analysis based on materials from the relevant module describing what you would choose to do in this scenario. (A grading rubric will be provided and used to evaluate your submissions.)

Note: For Reaction-Response and Situational Analysis assignments, students are expected to make connections with the course material. To avoid plagiarism and adhere to ASU's academic integrity policy, any time you include others' ideas in your work, you must make that clear by attributing it to the source. Always clearly mark direct quotes with quotation marks, and cite your sources appropriately. You will find additional details in the assignment prompts in your course.

Final Exam (35%): The final exam is a cumulative, multiple choice test based on the material covered in modules **1 through 7**. In addition to achieving an overall grade of 70%, all credit eligible students who have verified their identity must take a final exam to earn ASU credit.

Ungraded Activities

Many activities in this course do not directly contribute to your grade. These activities develop your knowledge and skill without penalty and are critical to your learning success and progress.

Introductions: Please visit the "Introduce Yourself!" section in "Before the Course Begins," and tell the course team and your classmates a little bit about yourself,

your community, and how you expect to change as a result of this course in the "Introduce Yourself!" discussion forum.

Topical Discussions: These discussion questions provide you with an opportunity to deepen your understanding of the material, apply what you have learned, and engage with your instructor and peers in the process.

Course Readiness Quiz: This quiz is designed to ensure you are familiar with the information covered in the "Before the Course Begins" section. While this quiz does **not count** toward your grade, you must successfully complete it to access module 1 and the remaining modules as they are released.

III. COURSE REQUIREMENTS AND COMMUNICATION

Course Requirements

Recommended Prior Knowledge: To be successful in this course, we recommend English language fluency and computer literacy.

Online Course Requirements: You will find all content and learning activities within the course. All course interactions use Internet technologies. You are encouraged to interact with your peers and course team in the discussion forums, and ask questions there as well.

Course Communication

All communication will take place via the discussion board, course updates, and course home page.

Final grades are based on the number of points you earn on the course activities listed above. There is no extra credit available. You can see your percentage of the total points to date on your progress page. Final scores will be absolute as follows: 90% or better will receive an A, 80% or better a B, 70% or better a C, below 70% is a failing grade. There will be no + or - added to grades.

Credit Eligibility: You must pass the course with a grade of C (70%) or higher and be on the Credit Eligible Track.
